Chris Crnich, MD, PhD is the Chief of Medicine and Hospital Epidemiologist at the William S. Middleton VA hospital and an Associate Professor of Medicine in the Division of Infectious Disease at the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health. He has a general research interest in healthcare-associated infections among vulnerable elderly patients with a specific focus on antibiotic-resistance in long-term care facilities. He has received research funding from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality, the Centers for Disease

Control and Prevention, and the Veterans Health Administration. His current research is focused on two areas: 1) implementation and evaluation of antibiotic stewardship interventions in skilled nursing facilities and 2) development and implementation of interventions to effectively reduce the cross-transmission of antibiotic-resistant bacteria between residents of skilled nursing facilities.

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Nasia Safdar, MD, PhD is the Associate Chief of Staff for the Office of Research and Development at the William S. Middleton Veterans Hospital. Dr. Safdar's research focuses on healthcare-associated infections. She is the PI of the QUERI-partnered evaluation project and a PCORI grant to develop a panel of engaged Veterans with lived experience with an infection and build a shared research agenda in this area.

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Aleksandra Zgierska, MD, PhD, FABFM, DFASAM is a tenure-track Assistant Professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison (UW) School of Medicine and Public Health, Department of Family Medicine and Community Health. She is board-certified in family medicine and addiction medicine; her clinical practice at UW Health focuses on the care of patients with addiction and chronic pain in primary care settings. For her work in the addiction medicine field, she was awarded a Distinguished Fellow title by the American Society of Addiction Medicine (ASAM) and recognized as one of the Madison Magazine's *Top Doctors* in Dane County in 2016 and 2018. Her federally-funded patient-centered outcomes research aims to enhance addiction and chronic pain care, and reduce opioid-related harms. She teaches students, residents and fellows in the UW family medicine residency and UW addiction medicine, pain medicine and research fellowships, and presents broadly on opioid therapy and addiction related topics. She is the Immediate-Past President of the Wisconsin Society of Addiction Medicine (WISAM), and a Board of Directors member of the WISAM and the ASAM.

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
